

Excerpt from Jute in Bengal This book was first published in 1908. One thousand copies of this edition were sold off within two years from the date of issue. But owing to my official touring duties, there has been a great delay in bringing out a revised edition of the work. However, I gratefully appreciate the approbation with which it was received by the public both in India and the United Kingdom, The book has now undergone a thorough revision and some new chapters have been added to it. Jute is one of the most important crops in Bengal and a very valuable asset of the Indian Empire. But the landless middle and poorer classes of Indian population complain often-times against the cultivation of jute, as they hold that this crop is responsible for the high prices of food grains. I have endeavoured in these pages to convince my readers that high prices have little to do with the cultivation of jute. On the contrary, the growers of, and dealers in jute have materially been benefited by the extension of its cultivation, and many others have greatly been relieved of the pressure which would otherwise have been more acutely felt them. As a touring officer of the Agricultural Department of Bihar and Orissa, formerly of Bengal, I have been closely connected with the crop for about 25 years. So far back as 1898, I started, on my own initiative, an enquiry regarding the races and qualities of jute grown in Backergunge (Chapter IV Part III).
